Dramatically Growing Need

Ohio's population is aging rapidly

- In **2000**, there were **1.5** million Ohioans 65 and older
- 2020 projected to be 2.1 million
- 2040, 2.8 million with 20% over the age of 85

Declining number of family caregivers available Changing family demographics, more women in the workforce, creating increased reliance on paid caregivers.

U.S.: "...17% of working adults care for a family member or friend, with this care valued at
\$470 billion per year. In the coming years, the U.S. will see the pool of informal caregivers upon which it relies shrink, from 7.2 potential caregivers per person in need, down to 2.9 potential caregivers per person in need in 2050."

Ohio: The caregiver gap. By 2050 in Ohio, there will be only **3 potential caregivers** for every person of late old age.



Cost of Long-term Services

Cost of long-term services and supports will exponentially increase for our families ...and Ohio (with increased reliance on formal public support services)

"... A higher proportion of the older population experiences poverty, compared to other adults. In addition, those at very advanced ages are mostly women who have outlived their spouses and most likely live alone. The combination of lower income, living alone and higher prevalence of disability among older women are all contributors to the need for long-term care services and supports."

Low savings. "...the average person over 65 has saved only \$156,000 in financial assets and home equity, while the average person experiencing a high need for long-term services and supports will rack up \$138,000 in healthcarerelated expenses, with one in seven incurring over \$250,000 of healthcare-related expenses."
