Don't hesitate to talk to a doctor or nurse if you have questions or concerns. Here are some of the questions medical professionals hear most often.

What are the side effects?

"As with any medication, the vaccine can cause some side effects. Any side effects are minor and last 24-48 hours. The most common are short-term fatigue, pain or swelling at the injection site, headache or a low-grade fever. These side effects are a sign that your body's natural immune response is working and developing protective antibodies to fight off the virus.

The chance of a serious reaction to a vaccine such as severe allergic reaction is extremely low. Don't believe rumors: the vaccine absolutely does not cause autism, infertility or alter a person's DNA. And you can't get COVID-19 from taking the vaccine. It's just not possible.

Remember that any side effects are minor in comparison the risk of serious illness from COVID-19. One day of feeling a little crummy to avoid getting the COVID-19 infection and getting really sick is a good trade."

Is the vaccine safe? Was it adequately tested?

"The vaccine was tested extensively before it received FDA authorization. The vaccine trials and research date back to the 2000s when researchers were studying SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome) caused by a coronavirus spreading at the time. This vaccine was not rushed.

America's researchers didn't cut corners or take short cuts. America cut red tape and bureaucracy to find vaccines.

More than 135^{*} million Americans and 6^{*} million Ohioans have now safely been fully vaccinated and are protected from dying or getting seriously ill from COVID-19 thanks to the work started last year when Americans pulled together to research, develop and test the vaccines."

What about herd immunity? Can't I just wait?

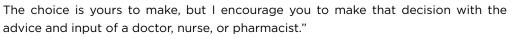

The clear benefits of getting vaccinated outweigh unknown and possibly nonexistent risks. The long-term side effects of COVID-19 are documented and devastating.
